P.1 Who Went First - I was one of
the very first members of the 306th
& 369th at Galt Lake Cr., and I was
in the nose of the B-18 that landed
in Wendover on 4-1-47 - our new base,
this was right after 50 yrs. ago.

In the summer we arrived in Scotland
on the River Eliz. both + through 2 by
60 feet.

I started flying combat missions on
March 4, 1944 as Bomberier. I had to
receive Commission after 50 combat hours,
which I required 25. I (we) were shot-

down March 26, 1944. I was to have
received my Tech Sergeant stripes (2nd)
and a "P" for Com Shorthair after, so
I never heard from the 369th, 386th or
the 8th H.F. again. I should pursue this!

The only crew names that I have seen
in the Schools are White, Dewitt, Miller
& Kotbeck (Recessant).

Dear Russ:

Thanks for switching me back to the
Fightin' Bitin' 369th, - my Squadron from
day-one.

In answer to your questions 8-4-92, -
I was sent to Salt Lake City Air Field in
Mar '42 from Farnsworth School - Savary
Field, Denver to join the 306th Group.
I believe it was April First day '42 that
we flew to our beautiful Wendover Base
in an old B-18, - I think it was our only
plane at that time. After returning from
Censor School in Lansing, Mich (Oldsmobile)
I served as an Armorer & Tow Target
operator on the old B-18.

Arrived at Thorpehugh early Sept '42, served
as Armorer & flew some precision missions
& North Sea Search missions till end of

'43, when they reduced my rank from T/Sgt. to S/Sgt. for (they said) over crowding in the T/Sgt. rank. Any way, - I finished my self - training for Bomberier rating and was given a Check-flight over the Wash Bomb Range by the Squadron Bomberier (I think the Group Bomberier was strong too). I successfully dropped 20, 100# practice bombs and was recommended for a Commission as Bomberier. Bomber Command informed our Group that I would have to have 50 combat hours first, - so I was assigned to Combat as an enlisted Bomberier (they weren't commissioning yet) and was told that I would get my T/Sgt rating back while waiting for a Commission. Well, - none of this ever happened and they now tell me the May 44 regulations didn't cover me. I informed them (recent years) that I had earned the Commission based on regulations in effect while I was flying.

Well nothing more has been heard.
My first ^{combt} mission was 3-4-44, I don't remember the Pilot's name, but Renold C.P., White Nav., Metzback Engg., etc.
The Pilot was wounded on 3-24-44 raid and Barney Price was our pilot when we were shot down (Flak) 3-26-44 in a brand new G-model (1st mission) over Pas De Calais, near St. Omer. This was my 7th combat mission.

All of us ended up at Stalag Luft I except White & Decker. They were badly injured and stay elsewhere.

Thanks, Russ, for letting me have you with all of this, - but it feels good to review it occasionally!
