AS NEAR AS I REMEMBER - AFTER 10 OR SO MISSIONS I WAS ASSIGNED AS REG. BALL GUNNER ON THE "VAPOR TRAIL" PLANE, THE ONLY NAMES I REMEMBER WAS LT. FIELD THE PILOT & (OVER)

+ SIDNEY SALEPSKI. "WAIST GUNNER." I HAD
SID'S ADDRESS + WROTE TO HIM AFTER THE
WAR. HE ANSWERED, SAID HE CHANGED HIS
NAME TO SIDNEY SAYLES, - I WROTE TO HIM A
COUPLE TIMES AFTER THAT, BUT HE NEVER
ANSWERED. HIS ADDRESS WAS N.Y. SOMEWHERE?

When I joined the 306th (from the Ordnance Co.)
The C.O. gave me strict orders not to keep a
diary or ever mention combat. That's why
it is hard to remember much about the people
& I all happened so fast, (as I expected to get
some training before going into combat) I
had never been in a plane, or off the ground
or fired a 50 Cal. gun, but sure learned fast.
(seems like I was jinked) Had so many
"aborts" & "scrubs" & real rough missions.
Was stuck in the ball & had to land in it
with the guns "half way down" - lost in
the fog over France with equipment all
shot up. FLEW SOME REAL ROUGH MISSIONS,

I DID MANAGE TO KEEP RECORDS OF THIS.

Dear Russell:

I just happened to see the reunion notice in the VFW magazine & would like very much to get some information.

In Dec. of 1943 I joined the 306th, 368th Squadron & flew about 15 missions & then was transferred to the Pathfinder field, for the plane to be fitted with the Pathfinder equipment. I was a spare ball turrett gunner & flew with different crews & when I finally got on as a regular crew member, that's when it happened. When we got there & found out that the pathfinder equip. went in place of the ball, I went back to the 306th. (I'm not sure, but I think the plane was called "The Vapor Trail" & Lt. Field was the Pilot.)

The 457th Bomb Group was just getting settled & the older experienced groups had to send a few men from the ranks, to help them from our experiences. That's when I went & finished my missions. 457th BG
750th Squad.


The reason I don't have any information is because when I come from the 1060 - 327th Service Group ("Ordnance") the CO at the 306th.

gave me strict orders that we weren't allowed to keep a diary or write anything about what we were doing. I had never been off the ground, or so much as been ⁱⁿ a plane. On my way - I went up once & when they "shot down" a plane & the next day they called me for a mission. That was to Kiel Germany Jan 4th 1944. The next day was the return to Kiel & on the fifth to Ludwigshafen. On Jan 11th my 4th mission I got credit for shooting down a Messerschmitt. Got the Air Medal for that & then a oak leaf cluster for my fifth mission.

On my way about all I have is the dates of my missions & things are pretty screwed up as far as remembering just when I left the 306th. I do know that I had 6 crash landings with the 306th.

Please let me know what goes on, now. Do you have an organization now? Write my book, written about the 306th? I would sure like to be part of it.

Dear Russell:

Thank you very much for your prompt action, with all the information about the 306th. I really appreciate it. Things were kind of mixed up about my combat, the way it all happened. Since leaving the hospital after 8 months things were quiet & I never heard a word from anyone who I served with during the war. (over 40 years)

About 5 years ago, I got a call from our radio gunner on the Glad Dodge. He said they tried to locate me for years & finally got me. I joined the 457th Bomb Group Ass't. & went to one reunion with them & am going again this fall. If things go right I hope to go to England next year with the 306th. My wife has "Lupus" & has flare-ups once in awhile, so it's pretty hard to plan ahead.

During my missions with the 306th I was put in for the "Silver Star" by the Pilot, but was transferred before it came thru. Also my Discharge shows only 3 clusters to the air Metal. I received the 9th metal on my 4th mission & a cluster for 5 missions. & with my moving around things got screwed-up. I was supposed to

have 5 clusters to the Gold Metal, as well as the Silver Star. I sent a form the V.A. office gave me & sent it in, but their reply was that my records show what is on my discharge. It really doesn't matter anyway.

I'm sending check for the Association \$25. & \$38. for the book. Also \$5. to C Dale Breslow for 306th Echoes.

Please excuse the sloppy writing & spelling. Today is my 70th birthday & my 3 daughters & rest of family & friends gave me a big surprise party, so I'm pretty (pooped-out)

could furnish some better ones. He
is listed in the 306th roster. I
talked to him & he said he would
help. I also one page 223 & 224
of the "First Over Germany" book -

story of our experience that day.

they run short of stories). I was the
Ball gunner that day & never a day
goes by but thoughts of it run
through my mind.

About our 14th mission we were transferred to the 305th B.G., to be fitted with Path-finder equips. Being a B all gunner I was sent back to the 305th (as the path-finder equips took the place of the Ball) Then I was sent up to the 459th B.G. because they were new & the older B.G.'s had to send experienced men to help them get started.

After a few missions as spare B all gunner I got on the "Falk Dodger" as a regular & finished my missions.
