Dear Olin:
Sorry to have been so delinquent in replying to your inquiry, but- here it is:

The 8th AF Historical Society contact man for the 398th is G. Hilliard, 7841 Quartermaine Dr., Cincinnati, OH 45236.

He may be of some help.
The best place to start looking for people is at their WWIIperiod home address, or at least the city.

If this is known, public libraries have many phone books, which may be helpful, or try putting in an information call to a city, costing now about 50 ceach. I sometimes, when I find no such person listed, ask for two or three numbers of people with the same last name. This has often bore fruit.

I did have a contact within the $V A$, but he has now retired. If anyone has been a POW, I would write the VA in Washington and ask for help. They are quite tuned in to Pows now. A congressman might also be of some help in this.

Public libraries, city or town clerks, or newspaper editors may be helpful. With the 306th, a number of inquiries sent to weekly newspaper editors have been published, and often someone knows where to make a contact.

I hope this can be of some help to you.

## Olin Martin Stansbury, Jr.

A private graveside service was held for Olin M. Stansbury, Jr. of El Dorado on Tuesday, Dec. 28, 1999. He passed away on Christmas Day, Dec, 25, at the Presbyterian Manor in Topeka, surrounded by family.

He was born in El Dorado, Aug. 26, 1924, to Olin and Lucille (Watkins) Stansbury. He graduated from El Dorado High School and then enlisted in the United States Army Air Force. He was commissioned a First Lieutenant from 1943 to 1946 and was a member of the
 369th Squadron, 306th Heavy Bombardment group.

As an Army navigator on a B-17 Bomber, he flew more than 50 missions over Germany in World War II. He received several Army accommodations during his years of service including the Army Air Medal, Good Conduct Medal, Army Occupation Medal for European Theater-WWII, American Theater and European Theater with two Battle Stars and a Victory Medal.

After the war, Mr. Stansbury attained his bachelor of arts degree from Washburn University in 1949 and later graduated in 1950 with a Juris Doctorate Degree from Washburn University. He also received a master's degree in education from Winona State University, Winona, Minn.

He practiced law and was appointed probate judge in Kingman. Before returning to private practice in Butler County, he was an attorney for the Veterans Administration and lived in Topeka and Wichita.

During his retirement from law, Mr. Stansbury published three books: "A Gift for Grandma (1996)," "Music: Notes on Notes from Slaves to Staves (1997)," and "Cooks: Faithful Trustees (1997)."

His involvement in the community included the Boy Scouts of America, Sea Scouts and he was a member of the Butler County Historical Society Museum, and much more.

He is survived by his daughter and son-in-law, Pamela and David Feinmark of Topeka; sister, Lucretia Caldwell of Decorah, Iowa; grandchildren, Lorenzo Cervantes of Kansas City, Mo., Rachel Cervantes-Reed and Kevin Reed, both of Topeka, Angela Cervantes of Kansas City, Mo., and Sgt. Enrique and Lisa Cervantes of Fort Sill, Okla.; and one great-granddaughter, Liliana Cervantes of Fort Sill.

Dear Russell:
After sending you my letter on June 10, 1981, I came across a couple of other things that might be of interest to let you know how the 306 th closed out the war.

The last full group bombing raid that I remember the 369 th squadron going on was May 19, 1945 which was a horrible raid over Falkenburg, a rail center south of Berlin where one of the major east-west German railroad lines crossed. My memory is that Captain Bill Haas received a Silver Star for leading the mission which was required to go over the target about four times due to extremely heavy anti-aircraft fire.

After May 19 th and before my flying record picks up again on May 3rd, I remember flying numerous leaflet sortees over both French and German territory. Since this closed out the war for the group perhaps my reminiscences might be of interest to you:
a. I remember the leaflet bombs were hexagonal wood "orange crates" with a barometric exploding device. Over Lubeck, Germany, I dropped a load of these. When the atmospheric device opened too soon, I watched $90 \%$ of our leaflets fall into the canal and this after such a long journey.
b. I remember checking the strength of the anticipated antiaircraft over St. Nazaire and Lorient, France. Since we were flying the leaflet mission alone, we took the B-17 up to 31,000 feet for our drop. The mission was uneventful except for the beautiful view of the coast lines of northern Europe, Ireland, and Great Britain laid out in front of us like a map as we let down heading back home. This was as high as I had been.
c. Probably the most memorable leaflet raid was one in which we participated shortly after the opening of Buchenwald

by our troops. We dropped not only leaflets but some small food parcels over this huge camp and spent considerable time after the drop viewing, among other things, the civilians digging up the mass graves and preparing individual burial plots to the south of the camp. There were still many residents in the camp of all nationalities who by that time had put up their own flags and gave us many friendly waves.
d. I am enclosing a photocopy of the leaflet we dropped on May 8th. As we came back from dropping this we heard Churchill announcing the end of the war and arrived back at the base to gunfire as the celebration had already began. Some of the personnel were firing arms. I have several other of these leaflets including one that announces that Hitler is dead. If you want to borrow the actual leaflets for any purpose, let me know and I will send them.
e. I also found my "passport" photo which we carried on missions to be used in the event we were shot down and needed identification papers. I am not sending that as I do not know if it would be of any interest.
f. I am enclosing the cover of our language folder including a page listing German and Spanish phrases. The pamphlet had four different languages.
g. I am enclosing a citation for the Air Medal which illustrates the language used at the end of the war for those of us who flew six combat missions. I send this to you for the use of the language and not for the use of my citation as this was my only award and is nothing compared with the Distinguished Flying Crosses, Silver Stars, and Distinguish Service Crosses which were earned by others present in the group.

I think this is about all $I$ have that will be of interest. If I find something else $I$ will send it on. If you are looking for anything in particular, let me know and I'll see if I can come across it. With my continued best wishes for success, I am,
