On 5th mission, groundlooped on an RAF field after Steeting raid. Never saw that plane again.

Took hit in nose, blew off pleiglass, killed bombardier and navigator. Large hole on right side of nose. Flew all the way home with bombardier's body still strapped to seat and hanging out nose.

Very noisy and windy with the nose off.

Navigator had been hit on head and knocked back into catwalk.

Lost two engines. #2 lost turbo down to 8000 and #3 feathered.

Hydraulic fluid all over.

On 10th mission, had to kick Shubel Owen out of plane.

Tarr went out nose door.

My dear Mrs. Tarr:

I have the honor to inform you that, by direction of the President, the Silver Star has been awarded to your husband, First Lieutenant William C. Tarr, Air Corps, and the Air Medal and one Oak-leaf Cluster, which indicates the second award of the same decoration, have been awarded to him while he was serving as Second Lieutenant. The citations are as follows:

SILVER STAR

"For gallantry in action, while piloting a B-17 airplane on a bombardment mission over Germany, 11 April 1944. Enroute to the target the squadron in which Lieutenant Tarr was flying was viciously attacked by twenty (20) FW-190 aircraft. During the initial assault; a burst of cannon fire shattered the plexiglass nose, killing the navigator and bembardier. Though two of the fighters were destroyed by members of the crew, the enemy succeeded in knocking out one engine, partially disabling a second engine, and rendering the hydraulic system useless. In spite of the battered condition of his plane and although still two hours flying time from the target, Lieutenant Tarr skillfully held a position in the formation and successfully bombed the target. He remained with the formation until over the North Sea and then ordering all unnecessary equipment to be jettisoned, headed for the nearest base in England. The gallantry, skill and determination to carry on in the face of great odds displayed by Lieutenant Tarr were directly responsible for the successful bombing of the target and the safe return of his

"For exceptionally meritorious achievement, while participating in ten separate bomber combat missions over enemy occupied Continental Europe. The courage, coolness and skill displayed by this officer upon these occasions reflect great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States."

Since these awards cannot be formally presented to your husband at this time, the decorations will be presented to you. The Silver Star, Air Medal and one Oak-leaf Cluster will be forwarded to the Commanding General, Third Service Command, Baltimore, Maryland, who will select an officer to make the presentation. The officer selected will communicate with you concerning your wishes in the matter.

Dear Mr. Tarr:

I chatted briefly with your wife the other night about the work I am doing on a history of the 506th Bombard ment Group, and I would like to ask for your help.

I am working carefully through much of the material now, and I certainly have to believe at this point that you had more trouble on a short tour than anyone with the Group during its entire combat experience of three years. Of course, the fact that you survived makes it even more interesting.

Could you tell me something about the loss of your first bombardier, having the nose shot off the plane, and finally going down on the Oberpfaffenhofen raid?

Has any of this been written up before and could you make such material available to me? Have you written down any of your experiences?

If nothing like this has happened perhaps you would have a tape recorder available and could just talk into it. I would be very happy to provide the tape for such a venture.

I have been "researching" the story for about a year now, and find it increasingly interesting. During that time I have been able to interview Col. Robinson, Group CO; John Bairnsfather, intelligence officer; Col. Regan, sqdn. commander; a number of gunners, etc. I think there is far more story than has ever been written, and yours is one of the better ones.

If you have materials--pictures, clippings, manuscrupts, etc.--you could loan me, I would return them almost immediately. I would like to see your Silver Star citation, and do you have any shots of your heavily damaged plane?

Also, do you know the whereabouts of any of your crew, or of other 306th friends? Or, where they may have come from? We are trying to locate every 306th member we can as a 306th association is being planned.

I am enclosing my usual collection of forms, and would appreciate all information you can give me.
