### Preserving Our Heritage

All of my life, my father has been telling stories like only he can tell them. As I came to appreciate his gift in the last few years, I also began to realize that he was not getting any younger. I worried that his stories would fade away with him, and that made me so sad to think about, for his stories were entertaining, thought-provoking, educational, and valuable.

Although he protested that "no one wants to hear my stories," I insisted that he allow me to tape him telling them. For several weeks, I spent a day with my parents, sitting on the couch for several hours with a tape recorder between us and my notes for prompting him should he need it. I also video-taped one of these sessions. When we were finished, I had one video-tape and five, 60-minute cassettes full of his stories from his childhood through his return from W.W.II.

Shortly thereafter, my family and I moved out-of-state and such a task would have been more difficult. Within just a few months, Dad had open-heart surgery and began his last year, dying only 15 months after our taping sessions, never having regained his vigor. If I had put-off the task at all, I would never have preserved his stories our story.

Since his death, I have realized just what a treasure I have. Not only is our family history and that of our nation preserved, but also, my Dad's voice! Several have already inquired as to how soon they will get a copy - they just want to hear his voice! What if I had waited?!

Very soon, I will begin the process of transcribing these tapes, making them more long-lasting in the face of changing sound technology, then making copies of both the tapes and the transcript for all the households in my family. I have gathered the most important of his official service records to include as well. I want future generations of my family to realize what a great person my dad was and to understand his pride for his country and his pride for his service. I want them to appreciate the sacrifices and difficulties of his generation, and I want my own young children to have some way of knowing their "GranGran."

### The 27th Mission

In the movie Saving Private Ryan, eight men risk their lives to find one soldier behind enemy lines in order to send him home as all three of his brothers have been killed in action. When Pvt. Ryan asks how can he leave his comrades and not finish his mission, Capt. Miller responds that his mission, now, is to go home, to live a good life for his family that is worthy of these who have risked, and lost, their lives for his sake. At the movie's end, the old man Ryan visits Miller's grave and wonders if he lived his life well, if he was worthy in his mission.

Towards the end of Dad's life, he asked - more than once - "Why was I allowed to live - out of all of us?" Only 16 of the 60+ men in his squadron came home. I believe the answer was that, like Pvt. Ryan, Dad had another mission: to live a good life for his family. Yes, Dad you were worthy of your (27th) mission.

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Copies of typical notes that I made on lack of my missions, It appears that weathers & spelling were not important to me at that time, Carl

Bernburg 41 lost Feb 22 Logan hit JU 88 plant-right at target 6 109s came in very close & caught us off guard. Had fighter attacks all the way out and saw many fiters on the way in. Saw three go down on the way in-one explode. I saw several planes of our group . . go down when as many as 15 or 20 came through at a time. Cierr got 190 but didn't get official claim. Lost 7 from base. Proctor & Fall went down in plane we had flown day before. I saw 4 parachutes on the way in. Lots of 20 mm exploding around and saw Estimated 100-150 fiters face to face-could see stripes on spinners & markings on sides of plane & wings. Bill had in his log 11 bomers down & and we circled one which our boys saw ditch & sent in position. We came back over Koln flack & was about as bad as I ever saw -Dash took us over Rotterdam flack. 
