

John G. Weber

CASPER — Services for John G. Weber, 70, will be conducted at St. Mark's Episcopal Church on Thursday at 11 a.m. by Father Benjamin R. Wright. Cremation has taken place under the direction of Bustard's funeral directors.

Mr. Weber died at his home July 16, 1995, following a short illness. He was born July 21, 1924, in

Cheyenne, the son of Jacob and Roberta (Drummond) Weber. He was raised and educated in



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Cheyenne, graduating from high school in 1941. He also attended the University of Wyoming.

In 1942, he enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Corps and flew the longest daylight raid of World War II, sinking the German battleship the "Admiral Scheer." Upon returning from the war, he returned to the University of Wyoming, where he graduated as a Civil Engineer in 1947. He returned to Cheyenne in 1949, and started a construction company. While in the construction business he oversaw the construction of various buildings throughout the state, including the Wyoming National Guard Headquarters, additions to the Wyoming Game and Fish building, the Wyoming Highway Patrol Headquarters, and many others. He moved to Casper in 1975, and was the manager of the Wyoming Contractors Association and the Building Division of the Associated General Contractors of America, retiring in 1985.

He married Geraldine Terrell on Dec. 30, 1986, in Casper.

He was past president of the Cheyenne Country Club, and a lifetime member of the Casper Country Club. He served on the Advisory Committee to the University of Wyoming College of Civil Engineering and the Construction Department of Casper College. He loved gardening and golfing.

Survivors include his wife; children, Richard Weber and Patricia Meschew, both of Tempe, Ariz., John Weber of Arvada, Colo., and Elizabeth Weber of Reston, Va.; mother of Cheyenne; sister, Frances Gard of Cathedral City, Calif.; and four grandchildren.
