"IRD A-575-A Fol mag reed 8AF D-67962 " The Supreme Commender Allied Expeditionary Force desires the following message be transmitted to all ranks of your command at the earliest possible moment, "Allied Soldiers, Sailors, and Airmen; Through your combined skill, valor and fortitude you have created in France a flecting but definite opportunity for a major Allied Victory, one whose realization will mean notable progress toward the final downfall of our enemy. In the past, I have, in moments of unusual significance, made special appeals to the Allied Perces it has been my honor to command. . ithout exception the response has been wastinged and the results beyond my expectations. Because the Victory we can now achieve is infinitely greator than any if has so far been possible to accomplish in the West, and because this opportunity may be grasped only through the utmost in seal, determination, and speedy action, I make my present appeal to you more urgent than ever before. I request every hirman to make it his direct responsibility that the enemy is blasted unceasingly by day and by night, and is denied safety either in fight or in flight. I request every sailor to make sure that no part of the hostile forces can either escape or be reinforced by sea, and that our comrades on the land want nothing that guns and ships and ships companies can bring them. I request every soldier to go formard to his assigned objective with the determination that the enemy can survive only through surrender; let no foot of ground once gained be relinquished nor a single German escape through a line once established. With all of us resolutely performing our special tasks we can make this week a momentous one in the History of this War - A brilliant and fruitful week for us, a fateful one for the ambitions of the Nazi Tyrants.
