Conduct of Military Personnel at Sites Bombed by the Enemy.

The following instructions issued in Section X, European T of Ops USA Cir. 32, dated 20 March 1944 are reproduced for the information and compliance of all Personnel of this Station.

"1. Individuals and small bodies of military personnel may occasionally find themselves in the immediate vicinity of an air raid incident involving casualties. While it is right for any person to render assistance under such circumstances, it must be realized that unorganized help may do more harm than good and may even endanger the lives of persons trapped in debris.

2. The following instructions will be made known to all US military personnel.
 2.1. The senior officer or NCO present at such an incident will immediately take command of all military personnel present and organize them into parties of approximately ten men, each under a leader. Such senior officer or NCO will then report to the Civil Defense Incident Officer (who wears a blue cover on his steel helmet and whose post is marked by a blue lamp or flag) and act under his instructions. In the absence of an Incident Officer instructions will be taken from the senior Civil Defense Officer present.

2.2. It is the duty of all service men present to place themselves under the command of the Officer or NCO who is organizing the parties; they will not attempt to carry out rescue work independently.

2.3. In general, the types of work contemplated for such parties are:

- (1) Clearing light debris from the site.
- (2) Clearing roads.
- (3) Assisting the civil police in control of the public and establishing cordons.
- (4) Acting as messengers and stretcher bearers.

3. These instructions are applicable only to such officers and non as are present at such an incident and not engaged in performing previously assigned duties. They will not be construed as calling for any personnel to cease other assigned duties, in the absence of competent orders so to do.
