4. NOTICE - EMI Cables are Suspended.

Suspension until further notice of all EMI cablegrams going out of England was announced yesterday by the British Postmaster General. It was assumed to be a security move as the invasives approached.

The ban applies to all American troops in the U.K., a representative of the British General Postoffice said.

EMI cables were sent at reduced rates. They consisted of numbers which, when decoded at the other end of the wire, would apply to such form messages as "Happy Birthday," "Arrived Safely," etc.

5. NOTICE - Air Mail Rates same here.

Recent increases in air mail rates will not affect mail in the United Kingdom sending or receiving mail from the U.S.

The increase, which affects persons writing only within the continental limits of the States, jumps the rate from 6 to 8 cents an ounce. Rate for air mail between here and the States is still 12 cents an ounce.
