2. ATTENTION ALL OFFICERS!!! Transportation will be provided to the party Saturday night, 22 Sep 1945, only for dates that have printed invitations. Trucks will be sent for not less than 10 miles from a given location. Be sure your date has an invitation and notify Lt Kelly at Extension 46 before noon Saturday, so that transportation can be provided.

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SUGGESTION: "The idea of air-train plane rides to Frankfurt, Edinburgh and Bournemouth, available to the personnel of this Station it's been a good thing. One of the main criticisms has been that not enough of the deserving men have been able to get on these rides, either because of their work or because they don't have the 'right connections'. In the majority of cases only the so-called 'wheelers' or their personal friends were able to go on the two day trips to Paris. There are still quite a few of us that have worked here on this Section from its' first mission, who haven't been able to go on any of those rides. I think it only fitting and proper that they should be given some consideration. I suggest that especially those veterans of 'Fourlight Station' be given an opportunity to visit Paris, even if only for one day. This would be a chance that a large percentage would never again have. Perhaps this experience would help compensate in a very small way for the 'let down' in morale for not getting the 'battle stars' that their associates received".

ANSWER: S.B. challenged you to name a single deserving man who was prevented from going to Frankfurt, Edinburgh or Bournemouth because he didn't have the "right connections".

As far as the Paris trips were concerned they quota was very limited and was fixed by higher Headquarters as to the number of officer's and enlisted men. The officers were picked by the Commanding Officer according to rank and length of service in the R.A.C. and no complaints have been heard about that method.

Enlisted men on the Paris trips were picked by the various unit C.O.'s and were not picked on a personal friendship basis and you know it. In most cases they were picked because they had contributed more to their unit and the Station than any one else. In the others, the Chemical Company for example, they were picked by lottery.

Due to changed conditions on the Continent we are not permitted to send any more home personnel to Paris.
