Mission: Oranienburg, 18 April, 1944.

TO : Commanding Officer, 306th Bombardment Group (H), APO 557.

1. Narrative

21 A/C of the 306th Group proper took off at 1011 hours, made satisfactory rendezvous and flew low group in 40th CBW. The Composite group taking off with 9 A/C of the 306th failed to make 40th CBW rendezvous until well out in the channel. Course was as briefed to the target area. Over the target the 40th CBW got broken up in the high cloud. Crews feel that the presence of 5CBW's all closing in to bomb in a target area no larger than one airfield and without sufficient interval between made it too crowded for effective bombing and also largely created the "cloud" over the target out of their own con-trails. This "cloud" was built up thicker by each successive Wing. As a result, the 40th CBW, last in, became split up in the cloud after bombing. 306th Group proper however flew around the cloud and on, well protected in the middle of other formations, eventually lining up behind the group with "J" in triangle and following it home on the briefed course. Composite Group, also separated, flew beyond target somewhat wide of briefed course, circled back and flew entirely alone to near German coast where it rejoined 306th Group Proper again. Both 306th formations crossed English coast at Louth at 1202 hours, German coast on course at 1350 hours, German coast back on course at 1555 hours, English coast at 1747 hours four miles north of Cromer, landed at base at 1830 hours.

2. Fighter Opposition and Fighter Support

No enemy fighters were seen by either our own group or those flying with the composite. Fighter support was generally good. P-47's were picked up at 1347 hours, three minutes before crossing the enemy coast on the way in at 5420N x 0834E. From this point on the 306th Group proper met their escort at all times at the briefed points. The composite group, flying high and led by the 92nd Group, lost the Combat Wing formation at the target and those flying with this group report no visible escort after the target until 1530 hours when P-38's were picked up south of Hamburg and escorted this group until it joined the Combat Wing near the enemy coast.

3. A.A. Gun Fire

A.A. Gun Fire at the target was meager to moderate and generally low. At Wessermunde quite a lot of A.A. Gun Fire came up on group to left.

4. Bombing

306th Group proper bombed on smoke from previous bombing which already obscured aiming point. Crews feel bombs were accurately dropped but results could not be observed and photos do not show this part of target area. Photos do show bomb bursts from other Combat Wings on buildings of 41-B CBW aiming point on North side of field and also big clouds rolling up from 2 concentrations in the Germendorf area; one in the woods just west of the plant and the other on

railway and buildings 3/4 mile north of Germendorf plant. A further scattered group of bombs appears in woods approximately 1 mile north of Annahof field. Composite Group, including nine A/C of 306th bombed late, due perhaps to bombs hanging up in lead A/C, as only two of its bombs came out at first-then the rest. This group's bombs almost certainly overshot target, the results could not be seen. While visibility was good up to target area allowing pilotage to the edge of the airfield. The cloud which hung at altitude over and just in front of target area made formation bombing difficult and somewhat obscured target from directly overhead. At Wittenberge (on Elbe) large buildings on River S.E. of town were burning fiercely. From this and other bombing crews observed that whole of Northern Germany was 10,000 feet high in smoke.

5. Leaflets

50 parcels of G-34's were dropped in target area.

6. Weather

Bank of con-trails piled up like a cloud directly over target by first Combat Wings hampered formation of last Combat Wing over. Weather CAVU outside of target area.

7. Observations

Effective smoke screens were observed at the south end of Lake Muritz, Luneburg, Salzwedel and at approximately 5254N x 1200E. Barrage balloons were over the town of Wittenberge (on Elbe). About 30 A/C were seen on airfield at Bremershaven. Over 30 S/B aircraft on the airfield at 5312N x 1230E. This lati field was flanked on South-east side by building shaped like race track. A large cleared strip at 5245N x 1140E appearing to be 1/2 mile wide and 3 to 4 miles long. Contained buildings. 15 to 20 ship convoy just off Heligoland headed for the island. Were shooting up flak. 2 P-47's dived to strafe.

8. Other A/C in Distress

1 B-17 seen to lose wing, last seen going down in spin at target. 8 chutes out.

B-17 apparently hit by flak, exploded at target. Four chutes reported. May be same A/C as above.

B-17 at 1503 hours at 5302N x 1205E was seen flying very low. Had friendly escort. 5 or 6 chutes out.

A silver B-17 was seen to burn and crash at 1430 hours near 5300N x 1200E.


At 5410N x 0730E three chutes seen over an oil slick at 1616 hours.

A/C returning early--Not Dispatched

Pilot Carlson, A/C 146-W, turned back at 1245 hours at 5345N x 0305E, personnel failure. Brought back 42 x M47A1.

Pilots McBride A/C 185-S, Clark A/C 250-G and Jones A/C 148-K, all spares, turned back at 5345N x 0300E at 1240 hours and flew back in formation each A/C bringing back 42 x M47A1.

From Calais to Berlin; The Invasion Imminent

Capital Blasted For 6th Time By USAAF

American bombers and fighters—between 1,500 and 2,000 of them—slugged their way across German skies to Berlin in daylight yesterday to resume the resumption of large-scale aerial assault which saw the Luftwaffe and Nazi targets hammered from the Pas de Calais to the heart of the Reich.

In a day-long assault, the Allied air command in the ETO threw light and medium bombers, heavies, and fleets of fighters into attacks on Nazi objectives in France, Belgium and straight across Germany. Battered but desperate, the Luftwaffe put up screens of fighters along its route, and some air divisions came home to tell of three-hour battles with as many as 200 Nazi fighters.

Among the day's targets, aside from those in Berlin proper, were the Heinkel Bomber works at Oranienburg, some 20 miles northeast of the capital, and an aircraft components plant at Raphenow, 35 miles northwest.

First official announcements did not list American losses or claims, but German radio broadcasts were much more conservative in tone than in recent raids. Unofficial preliminary indications were that bomber losses would be almost tactically light.

The attack on the Berlin area was the Eighth Air Force's sixth and brought back to the ETO the major share of that three-way air pincer on Germany.

Bulgarian Rail Center Hit

In the south, Allied bombers based in Italy kept up their share of the attack with night blows on Plovdiv, Bulgarian rail center linked to the Russian front; and the Soviet Air Force in the east resumed the attack with a blow at Galatz, Danube port and railhead for Nazi reinforcements bound for the Red battlefronts.

The heavy bomber attack from British bases, while including small Liberator raids on military objectives in the Pas de Calais, was aimed straight at the industrial and aircraft manufacturing center of Germany as part of the campaign to destroy the Nazi air force north and south, and at the same time to smash the continent-wide network of rail transport vital to German defenses against Allied invasion and the Russian steamroller as well.

Co-ordinated with the main blow were attacks by Marauder medium bombers against targets in northern France and railway yards at Charleroi, Belgium, while RAF and Allied Bostons, Mitchells and Mosquito bombers hit objectives behind the French coast. Ninth Air Force Thunderbolts and Allied Spitfires supported them, and swept against German fighters as well.

Wary of the Forts and Libs since their first penetration to the Nazi capital on Mar. 4, the Luftwaffe put up masses of determined fighters, and from 1 PM to 4 PM German radio broadcasts gave almost blow-by-blow descriptions of the final battle in the clouds above the Reich.

Some heavy bomber divisions, however, came back late in the day—it was one of the latest large-scale raids in weeks—and reported virtually negligible fighter opposition.

Liberator formations generally reported few attacks, and meager to moderate flak. Some Fortress units described a fight for their lives with almost endless relays of fighters, while other B17 units, led by Col. Eugene A. Romig, of Eyesville, Ohio, took scant punishment.

"Fighters protected our wing perfectly,"

and not a single Jerry bothered us," said Col. Romig. "We ran into moderate flak, but it did not interfere with our bombing run."

Surprising to all the formations heading into Germany's heaviest flak belt was the relatively light anti-aircraft defense. A few groups met intense fire, but only for a short time, while most other reports described it as only moderate.

Weather varied, and while the Nazis complained over the radio that heavy clouds interfered with their interceptors, Lt. Warren S. Emerson, Nelly, Ind., fighter pilot, came home to report: "Clouds of black smoke covered the city, punctuated by a big red ball of fire."

P-38 Lightnings, P-47 Thunderbolts and P-51 Mustangs, drawn from both the Eighth and Ninth Fighter Commands, flew in relays with the bombers, carrying on their campaign to exterminate the Luftwaffe before invasion, which up to yesterday morning had accounted for 266 enemy aircraft in air combat during April for the loss of 115 U.S. fighters. In addition, scores of enemy planes have been destroyed on the ground, and 220 others shot down by bomber gunners for the loss of 185 four-engined craft.

The last time Allied bombs fell on Berlin was the night of Mar. 24, when the RAF heaped some 2,750 tons on it. Since the real Battle of Berlin began, the RAF and USSTAF probably have dropped almost 35,000 tons on the Nazi capital and its immediate industrial suburbs.
